PREFACE.

THE Egyptian Antiquities very briefly described in the following pages, were gathered together by that indefatigable collector, the late F. G. Hilton-Price, Esq., for many years a Fellow and Official of the Royal Society of Antiquaries, and a member of many other learned Societies. A keen collector in many branches, it was still to Egyptian antiquities that he gave his chief, and most continuous, attention. Beginning with these many years ago, at a time when private collectors were very limited in number, and aided by personal visits to Egypt and participation in several privately arranged schemes for excavations in that country, he gradually formed the very large collection now set out, in its entirety, for Although lacking the imposing monumental pieces that are to be found in many museums and public institutions, it is yet completely illustrative of the arts and crafts of the ancient Egyptians, from pre-dynastic times to the days of the Roman occupation, and is, without doubt, the most important and most comprehensive collection that has ever been offered for sale in England.

Collectors of Egyptian antiquities still remain comparatively few in number; in a great measure this is due to the fact that, to appreciate and understand these works, one must be not only a lover of art, but also a student—one with no mean enthusiasm for this particular branch of ancient history. The beauty of the productions of the ancient Greeks and Romans has, for several centuries, appealed to and been appreciated by all; a result born of, and nurtured by the attention that has, for an equal period, been given to the history of these peoples in our schools and universities. But it is otherwise with the ancient Egyptians; here, as recently as a hundred years

ago, any precise, first-hand, knowledge of the race, its history, language and remains was a closed book—a book of which many, if not most, pages remain sealed even at the present day.

To the serious student of antiquities no field of collecting, then, can be more refreshing than this of Egypt: since in groping through the mists of uncertainty which still partially conceal from us the ancient Egyptians, there is a constant prospect of his making such discoveries as will, little by little, not only add to his own pleasure and knowledge, but will also be of the greatest service to later travellers over the same ground.

N.B.—The late Mr. Hilton Price published, in 1897 and 1908, two illustrated catalogues of the collection. In the present sale catalogue references to the latter work are shown by bracketed numbers.

4 A curved Knife, 6 in. long; Kahun; (2909). Five deeply serrated Flakes (from sickles); Abydos, Kahun and Nagada. And three fine Arrow Heads with long barbs, Nagada; (4398-400)

- 5 A small narrow Celt in Diorite (?), 4 in. long; polished at the edge; Bubastis; (4003). Another, in polished felspar, 2¹/₄ in. long; Elephantine; (4402). Another, of triangular shape, 1⁵/₈ in. long; in basalt (?); Sakkara; (4150); all rare
- 6 Parts of two fine Knives, a Flake and two other Pieces, all from Kahun. Seven Flakes, Saws, &c., from Nagada and Beni-Hasan 12
- 7 A fine Kuife, with tang or handle; fashioned from a broad and thin flint; 7³/₄ in. long by 2¹/₂ in. wide in centre; Abydos; (4147); a fine specimen and rare
- 8 A similar Knife, 7\(^3\) in long by 2\(^1\) in wide; (4148); from the same locality as last and equally fine
- 9 Another, 7³₄ in. long by 2 in. wide; in fine material and better fabricated; the back edge finely curved from butt to point; site of Hierakonopolis; (4935); a very choice specimen [Pl. 1]
- 10 A remarkably fine Kniff, made from a broad and very thin piece of flint; $9\frac{1}{2}$ in. long by $2\frac{1}{2}$ in. wide; the front with fine rippled chipping, the back rubbed down and polished; the curved end and cutting edge chipped with minute serrations, the butt and back dull-edged and almost straight; Abydos; (4525); complete, but has been broken and repaired [Pl. 1]
- A remarkably fine Spear Head with broad fish-tail head; in a very thin piece of fine yellowish chert or flint; extreme length 5 in., width at top 2\(\frac{5}{2}\) in.; of long triangular form with incurved sides; the whole of the upper edge, and more than half the length of the side edges, are chipped with minute and wonderfully regular serrations; Nagada; (3931); exceedingly fine and very rare [PI, I]
- 12 A similar Weapon in a darker coloured stone; Nagada; (3932);
 equally fine work, but one of the corners has been repaired
 [Pl. I]
- A small, remarkably fine and regularly made Arrow Head, in dark red stone; finely barbed and tanged; Abydos; (4750). Two others, of ordinary make, one with long tang; Nagada; (4019). A long slender Borer, 2½ in. long; Fayoum; (5023). And a Card with five Flakes and a Saw; Medoom; (2907)
- 14 A Mace Head; black syenite, with white marbling; 2½ in. long; of ovoid form, with a large hole drilled, lengthways, through the centre; Abydos; (4776); perfect and very rare

15 A Mace Head, of speckled syenite; shaped as a squat cone, with a large hole drilled through the centre; 3% in. diameter, 1¼ in. thick; the sides and disk-like top, flat; Abydos; (4311); perfect and rare 1
*** The exact use of these objects is unknown; by some they are assumed to be the "caps" for fire drills.

- 16 A similar Mace Head, and of the same size; Abydos; (4312); broken at the edge
- 17 A similar Mace Head; syenite; $3\frac{\pi}{8}$ in. diameter, $1\frac{\pi}{8}$ in. thick; the sides straight, the top hollowed to the centre; Abydos; (4673); a fine specimen, the edge slightly chipped
- 18 Another, about 3¾ in. diameter, and 1⅓ in. thick; with incurved sides and concave top; Abydos; (4313); a fine specimen

- 19 Another, 3½ in. diameter, ¾ in. thick; as last; Abydos; (4440); the edge broken
- 20 Two smaller Mace Heads of the same type, about $2\frac{1}{4}$ in. diameter, $\frac{3}{4}$ in. and $\frac{7}{8}$ in. thick; with deeply incurved sides and slightly concave tops; Abydos; (4144, 5)
- 21 A Mace or Club Head; marble; 4\sum_3 in. long; of long oval shape, pointed at each end and with a large graduated hole drilled through the centre; Abydos; (4314); a fine and perfect example
- 22 A similar Mace Head; stone; 6 in. long; of slender form, the central hole drilled through somewhat diagonally; a long line with hooked ends engraved on one side; Abydos (?); (4715); very rare 1

BRONZE IMPLEMENTS.

- 23 An exceedingly early adze-shaped Axe-head; apparently east in almost pure copper; the blade is slightly curved, and broadens out at top and bottom; the top corners, now missing, appear to have been of considerable length; Nagada; (3971); very rare
- 24 A flat bronze ADZE (or Celt), 7³/₄ in. long; of very early type; from Shibin-el-Kanatar; (2864); very rare
- A long AXE-BLADE of thin bronze; 8 in. long, 23 in. wide in centre; with lunate cutting edge and two segmental openings at back; a single piercing at the ends and two in the central tang; the weapon was fitted into deep slots in the wooden handle, and attached by thongs passed through the holes and over the notched ends; the blade has a slight mid-rib on each side, and is ornamented with line-patterns; Bubastis; (4001); very fine; possibly unique

- 26 A similar AXE-BLADE, of thin bronze; $10\frac{3}{4}$ in. long, $2\frac{1}{8}$ in. wide in centre; three holes in central tang and at each end; the edges of the segmental openings at back beaten up to form a ridge; the blade plain; Luxor; (2861); a very fine specimen, and very rare 1
- 27 An AXE-BLADE of similar form but much longer; $16\frac{1}{8}$ in. long by $2\frac{1}{8}$ in. wide in centre; three holes at each end and in central tang; (2861A); an unusually long specimen [PI. II]
- A long narrow AXE-BLADE, of thin bronze; 10 in. long by 2 in. wide in centre; the cutting edge curved; the back straight, and flattened for fitting into a slot cut in the haft; a deep notch at each end for taking a thong; Akmim; (3972); very rare
- 29 An AXE-HEAD, of bronze: 6¼ in. long; the narrow blade, of long chisellike form, is 4¾ in. long, and from ¾ in. to 1 in. wide; the large loop or opening for the handle ornamented with a raised band; Upper Egypt; (4725); a rare form [Pl. II]
- 30 A similar Axe-head; 4% in. long (the cutting edge broken off); an opening on the under side near the hafting loop; Gizeh; (5018); rare [Pl. II]
- 31 An AXE-BLADE, of thin beaten bronze; 4½ in. long at back, 3¾ in. broad; pierced with four holes for taking thongs; the cutting edge rounded; the back straight, and arranged for setting into a deep slot in the haft; Gebelaya; (2862); a fine specimen, and rare
- 32 Another Axe-blade; of similar form but more massive; $4\frac{1}{4}$ in, long at back, $2\frac{1}{4}$ in, broad; pierced with three holes; the ends of the straight back project and are hook-shaped; Akmim; (2863); rare 1
- 33 A Battle Axe; the fan-shaped blade of thin bronze with segmental openings at the back, the handle of wood; diameter of blade, 4¹/₄ in.; the staff 12 in. long; from Saimeineh; (2860)
 - And an Axe-blade of thin bronze, with parallel sides and rounded cutting edge; the back straight and made for fitting into a long slot in the staff; Upper Egypt; (4078); both rare and interesting 2
- 34 An Axe Blade of pierced bronze, with figure of a lion attacking an antelope; length 4 in.; very fine and very rare; (4694)
- 35 A similar object, with figure of antelope and lotus; length 4½ in.; from Luxor; (2862A); of excellent style, and very rare
- 36 Another, with figure of a lion walking; length 3\(\frac{1}{8}\) in.; from Thebes; (4677); of lighter make than preceding pieces, but equally fine and rare

- A remarkable GLAIVE or AXE-BLADE, of bronze: 164 in. long; a long thin and narrow blade with tang at bottom and slight central ridge; the width gradually increases towards the top, where it curves round and ends in a point; at the back it has five large holes for taking thongs; the weapon appears to have been fitted into a slot cut deeply into a wooden shaft curved to fit the back edge of the blade; Upper Egypt; (4077); exceedingly rare [PI. II] 1
- 38 A socketed HoE (or Adze); of bronze; $3\frac{1}{2}$ in. long, $4\frac{7}{8}$ in. across the blade; the blade somewhat curved, the large oval socket pierced for taking a rivet; Shibin-el-Kanatar: (2886); very rare 1
- 39 A similar HoE; the blade smaller, and only 44 in. wide; Bubastis; (2885)
- A Dagger, of thin bronze with ornamental handle; total length, 13 in.; exposed length of blade, 9 in.; the blade, of slightly tapering form with broad central rib and tang, is attached to the handle by three rivets; the ornamental handle, consisting of a framework of three lengthway divisions, was originally inlaid with wood; it broadens out at the end to receive a circular pommel of ivory, with two lunctte piercings near the inner side; from the Walliss collection; (3832); a very rare and interesting piece [Pl. II]
- A similar Dagger; total length about 12¼ in.; exposed length of blade, 8¾ in.; the blade broader and with straighter edges; the shoulder pieces of the handle, where they grip the blade, are shaped as duck's heads and necks; of the ivory pommel fragments only remain; Drah-abul-Nekkah; (2890A); a very interesting and probably unique variety [PI. II]
- A short Sword, of thin beaten bronze; 14 in. long; the blade, broad and obtusely pointed, has two narrow grooves worked along the centre; the handle-plate, narrow in the middle and broadening out to the base, appears to have been covered on each side with long strips of two varied substances placed alternately side by side; judging from the patina markings the handle must have been of unusual length, $5\frac{1}{4}$ in. long; Nagada; (4410); very rare [Pl. II]
- 43 A long Spear-head with tang; bronze, 13½ in. long; the blade leaf-shaped with high central rib; the tang, 4¼ in. long, circular, and turned round at the end to catch a stay-pin running through the shaft; Cairo; (2888A).
 - And two socketed Spear-heads of bronze, 7 in. and 6¼ in. long; the blades very narrow (about ¾ in.); Nankratis; (3973, 4) 3

- 44 An interesting collection of thirty-three Arrow Heads in bronze varied size and type; all finely preserved
- 45 A Knife with hooked handle, of very thin beaten bronze; 9½ in. long the blade slightly curved; the wire-like handle is fashioned from the same piece, and terminates in a duck's head; Middle Empire (4301); rare [Pl. II]
- A bronze Knife, 6 in. long; Kahun; (2894). Six thin plates

 (2901). Four small Models of Axe-blades in bronze (from found

- 47 A bronze RAZOR, the blade 64 in. long; a long curved handle fitted the lower side; Drah-abul-Nekkah; (2895); very rare
- 48 A similar RAZOR; the blade, 7 in. long, marked with the nefer si-("goodness"); Bubastis; (4002); very rare
- 49 A large socketed CHISEL; bronze, $3\frac{\pi}{8}$ in. long; the cutting edge about $\frac{\pi}{8}$ in. wide; (4726); and two bronze CHISELS for setting inthandles, one with a splayed edge, about $\frac{\pi}{4}$ in. wide, the other about $\frac{\pi}{16}$ in.; (3610, 4786); all very interesting and rare
- 50 A set of five small Models of Tools, in bronze, with wooden handle—axe, saw, knife, chisel and hoe, or adze; from the tomb of Sebek-Hetepa, at Beni-Hasan; (4915); interesting and very rare
- 51 Two Knives (or razors) of thin beaten bronze; 7 in. and 7½ in. long each has a shaped blade with a cutting edge at each end; Drahabul-Nekkah; (2891). Two Knives of thin bronze; 5½ in. and 7½ in. long; the blades spatula-shaped; Tel-el-Amarna; (2896, 4012)
- 52 Three small Instruments of bronze (tweezers and pricker combined with knife or lancet); a pair of bronze Incense Tongs with claw-shaped ends; and a smaller pair of Incense Nippers in bronze; (1450, 2892, 2914, 3970 and 4161); an interesting lot 5
- 53 Four Cards mounted with small bronze Implements: six chisels (Sak-kara, 3613); six small chisels (Gurob, 3609); six small knives (Gurob, 3612); an ear-pick and a bodkin (Gurob, 3663)
- 54 Four Cards with bronze Needles from Abydos, Gurob, Kahun, and Thebes; XII and XVII dynasties; to one of the cards two stibium rods in ivory are added; (2912, 13, 15, 5054)

- A Figure of AMEN Ra; black steatite; 8½ in. high; a standing figure, bearded and wearing a crown from which rises two tall feathers and a disc; both arms pendent; an ankh in the right hand; a shenti around the loins; (4134); fine and perfect; very rare in
- 56 A Figure of Ausar (Osiris); in green schistous stone; 7½ in. high (the feet wanting); a bearded mummiform figure with feathered crown, holding the crook and flail; Sakkara; (2420); very finely carved and finished
- A small Figure of Auset (Isis) nursing Heru; dark heavy stone; 6½ in. high; the goddess wears an unusually long wig, on which rests the crown, formed by a band of uraei supporting the horned dise; on the support at back and on side of throne, a dedicatory inscription; Fayoum; (4506).
 - And the upper part of a Figure of the same goddess; grey stone; $2\frac{3}{4}$ in.

 high; a hole at the top of the head for a crown or head-dress;

 Bubastis: (2447)
- A small Figure of Auset nursing Heru; serpentine; 3\frac{3}{4} in. high; (2341).

 And the upper part of a similar Group, the head of the young god wearing the psehent; a dedication inscribed on that part of the back column which remains; Bubastis; (2351); both finely carved and interesting
- 59 A SMALL AND VERY FINE FIGURE OF TA-URT; hematite; $2\frac{1}{2}$ in. high; the usual erect figure of a hippopotamus with the forelegs replaced by human arms; a full wig upon the head; (2556); extremely fine work and exceedingly rare of this size in hematite [PI. XXIX] 1
- 60 A small mummiform Figure of Ra, seated on the ground; a dedication around the base; limestone; 2³/₄ in. high; Bubastis; (3855).
 - Two very small Figures of Ta-urst and Ptah-Seker-Ausar; in porphyry (2467, 4502). A small crucible-shaped Mortar in alabaster; (1489). And a Figure of a Toad in dark serpentine, the eyes inlaid with two large pieces of crystal or quartz; Bubastis; (3997) 5
- 61 Six small Figures of Isis, Maat, Net (2), Nephthys and Thoth; all carved in lapis lazuli; and a small Figure of Ptah-Seker-Ausar, in blue stone (?), with an inscription at the back and remains of a head-dress in silver; all rare

- 62 A large Cippus of Horus; in dark stone; about 10 in. high by 6 in.

 wide; the figure of the god, carved in relief, standing upon two
 crocodiles and holding two uraei and a scorpion in each hand;
 upon his head, a mask of Bes, facing; on the back, various incised
 figures of gods, arranged in four registers; Bubastis; probably of
 Ptolemaic period; (2317): unusually large; repaired

- 63 A small Cippus of Horus, in black stone; the god shown nude and standing upon two crocodiles; in his right hand a scorpion, uracus, and antelope; in the left, two uraci, a scorpion and a lion; a head of Bes above, and a hawk sceptre to left. The back is covered with a very long and carefully engraved inscription; 5 in. long; (4132)
 - And a similar Cippus with figure of Bes, facing, brandishing a sword and holding a serpent in his left hand; a second serpent hangs from the right arm; Cairo; 7 in. long; (3205); the first a fine specimen 2
- A small Cippus of Horus, finely carved in a very transparent piece of steatite; 2\(\frac{3}{4}\) in. high; the god, carved in high relief, is shown nude and standing upon two crocodiles; in his right hand, two serpents, a scorpion and a goat; in his left, two serpents, a scorpion and a lion; above his head, a mask of Bes; the background, sides, back and base covered with inscriptions; Bubastis; (2318). Another, fractured, cut in a very thin piece of harder steatite; the designs in lower relief; the standards of Horus and Nofer-Atmu, placed beside the god, unusually well defined; (2320); both very good specimens
- 65 A small standing Figure of Harpakhrat (the lower parts of the legs wanting); marble; 3³/₄ in. high; the god is nude, has the head shaved, except for a pendant lock of hair over the right ear, and places his right index finger on his lips; Bubastis; Greek period; (4039)
 - And a smaller fragment of a similar Figure (or of Horus); in soft limestone; $2\frac{1}{2}$ in. high; the left hand holds a bird (a duck?), clasped tightly to his breast; over his left shoulder a satchel; a chain with bells around his neck and rings attached to his ears; Bubastis; (3130); both of very fine work
- 66 Sepulchral Figures of THEN-THA and his wife AFA; calcareous stone; 10½ in. high; the figures draped and standing side by side, their names inscribed on the upper side of the base; IV or V dynasty; Tana; (3127); a well preserved and very early specimen

- A small sepulchral Figure of Heru, a priest of Amen; $2\frac{5}{8}$ in. high; a seated figure wholly enveloped in the mummy clothing except for the hands, which hold a staff and ankh, and rest upon, the raised knees; upon the sides, and also on the support at back, is an inscription in well-formed hieroglyphs; (4355); very perfect and unusually fine and pleasing in style [PI. XXIX]
- 68 The upper part of a sepulchral Figure of a Priest (?); fine limestone; 3¼ in. high; he wears a full wig and has the usual loin cloth; Abydos; (4138); of early style; very fine and rare
- 69 A very fine FIGURE OF A SCRIBE, kneeling; basalt; 5 in. high; he has a full wig and wears a tunic (shenti); between the hem of the garment and the body are inserted two uncertain objects; the hands lie flat upon the legs; (4563); a very fine and pleasing work of the early Middle Empire [PI. VI]
- 70 A very fine early Figure of a Scribe or functionary; alabaster;
 7½ in. high; he has the head shaved and wears a wide loin cloth;
 both arms hang by the sides; (3113); of very fine early style
 (XII dynasty); in excellent preservation
 1
- 71 A small Statuette of a Woman, named Thuana; in black steatite; 64 in. high; a nude figure with long hair, both arms hanging by the sides; two necklets around the neck; the body encircled by an ornamental girdle; the supporting column and top and sides of the oblong base all inscribed; A VIII dynasty; (4160); very rare
- 72 A very early sepulchral Figure of a Functionary, limestone; 9 in, high; a standing figure wearing the shenti and a full wig; the whole bears traces of colouring; V dynasty; Sakkara; (4072); of extremely early date and vare
- 73 An extremely fine Portrait Head from a sepulchral figure of a priest; in very hard black stone; about 3 in. high; the shaved head of long narrow form, rising and expanding towards the back; the cheek bones high, the lower jaw square and solid; the features are most characteristically and realistically treated; Saitic: XXVI Dynasty; (4414); an extremely fine and valuable piece [PI. III]
- 74 Head from a sepulchral Figure of a Priest: in basalt; $3\frac{1}{2}$ in. high; from Sakkara; Middle Empire style; (3134); well modelled and finished: the nose slightly abraded

- 75 The upper part of a sepulchral Figure of a Priest, wearing a wig; in basalt, 5 in. high; an inscription at the back appears to have been purposely erased; Middle Empire; Bubastis; (3136)
- 76 A small sepulchral Figure of a Functionary—Ahmes—mummiform and scated on the ground; in basalt; height 5¾ in.; three lines of inscription across the front and another down the side; Luxor; (3106a); the left hand corner of the base wanting, otherwise in excellent condition
- 77 A FINE STATUETTE of a Man, walking; in fine close-grained lime-stone; $10\frac{1}{2}$ in. high; he wears a large bushy wig, or head-dress, falling to the shoulders; the body and arms are enveloped in a sort of pallium, opened up at the neck and leaving the chest bare; it appears to represent a thick material, is somewhat closely wound around the figure and nearly reaches the ankles; the upper edge is ornamented with a broad border; a stout cord, attached to an upper corner, is tightly grasped by the right hand; the left hand is thrust from beneath the robe and lies extended upon the chest; the feet are bare; on the sides of the oblong plinth is an inscription painted in black; XII dynasty; Sakkara; (4707); a very fine and exceedingly rare specimen
- 78 Male Head from a large statue; calcareous stone; $4\frac{1}{2}$ in, high; wearing a short curly wig arranged in parallel bands and coloured black; the face very carefully modelled and originally coloured red (traces of this colouring remain); IV or V dynasty; (3125); from the Bateman collection; of fine and unusually pleasing style 1

 - Another, in dark steatite (?); shaped as a gazelle, with the legs tied together ready for sacrifice; length 4³ in.; (4005)
- 251 Part of a small Tablet, of thin slate or stone, with relief designs; of irregular oblong form; on one side figures of two goats standing on their hind legs; on the other, the lower parts of two giraffes, a palm tree between them; from Abydos; (5015); of excellent style and pre-dynastic period; representations of the giraffe are exceedingly rare
- 252 A Stone Mould, with figure of the "Bennu" bird of Heliopolis: and a pair of stone Moulds, with similar designs; from Bubastis; (3548, 4015). Another, smaller; (3536). A Mould, in hard sandstone, one side with figure of Baubo, the other with altar of Asklepios; Roman date; (3517). A small stone Mould for making wax figures of Amset; (3537). A small shallow Mortar, of alabaster, with spout; from Kom-el-Amar; (3820); and a two-handled Vase of alabaster; Gurob; (3400)

- A small standing figure of AMEN-RA; 7 in. high; the right arm by his side, the left held out in front; he wears a striped cloth around the loins, and an ornamental collar; bands around the upper part of each arm; the beard, braided up and curled round at the point; upon his head a flat-topped crown, and a lofty head-dress consisting of a solar disc and two tall straight feathers : the right foot wanting; (2157a); fine and rare; alabaster stand
- A small Figure of AMSU (or Khem); 5 in. high; wearing the crown and feathered disk of Amen, and supporting a flail with his raised right arm; (4686); rare and of fine style and preservation; on alabaster plinth
- A similar bronze Figure of AMSU: 41 in. high; the flail and feathered 255 head-dress missing; Thebes; (2162); on black marble stand
- A small bronze Figure of AN-HER; $4\frac{1}{2}$ in. high; a male figure, bearded and with close wig; a uracus over the forehead, and a head ornament of four straight feathers raised upon a flat circular base; a long skirt and a loin cloth drapes the body and legs; the right arm raised, the left held in front of the body; (4879); a very rare figure
- A small bronze Figure of ANHER; 3 in. high; draped in the usual long skirt; a curious cylindrical ornament upon the head; the remains of a rope shown across the body; from the Sabatier collection; (2171). And a small Figure of the same God, with the feather head-dress; 1\(\frac{7}{8}\) in, high; Bubastis; (2172); both very rare; alabaster stands
- 258 A fine bronze Figure of ANPU (Anubis); 6 in. high; a jackal-headed figure, with narrow cloth around the loins, and wearing the royal head-dress; a beaded collar around the neck; the left arm bent and extended, the right pendant by the side; from the Hoffman sale; (2175); very fine and rare; velvet stand
- A small standing Figure of the goddess Anput (a feminine form of Anpu or Anubis); 4 in. high; a standing jackal-headed figure; a loin cloth and a long skirt, reaching to the ankles, fastened around the waist; the left arm hangs by her side, the right bent and held in advance; (2191); exceedingly rare and well preserved; alabaster stand

- 260 A small bronze Figure of the god AP-UAT; 5 in. high; a jackal-headed deity, seated on a throne; a cloth around the loins, and a flail in the right hand; the sides of the throne ornamented with engraved designs; an inscription around the base; (2192); (this god is sometimes confused with Anpu, or Anubis); very rare; on alabaster stand
- 261 Two small bronze Figures of AP-UAT, $1\frac{3}{4}$ in. and $1\frac{1}{2}$ in. high; jackalheaded, wearing short time and holding crook and flail: the larger figure (from Sais) shown kneeling on the left knee; the smaller rests on both knees and has at the back, a figure of a hawk with a large disk upon the head; (from Bubastis); (2193, 3193A); both very rare figures, on alabaster stands
- 262 A very large Figure of AUSAR (Osiris); bronze; 20½ in. high; mummiform; wearing the usual atef crown, with feathers at side and uracus in front, and holding crook and flail; (2413); the dedicatory inscription around the base addressed to "Ausar-Unnefer"; very rare of this size
- 263 A bronze Figure of Ausar (Osiris); 7½ in, high; mummiform, bearded and wearing a simple het crown (without feathers); a collar around the neck and the crook and flail in his hands; from the Hoffmann collection; (4209); very fine, on relect stand
- 264 A very fine large bronze Figure of AUSAR, seated; 11 in. high; mummiform and bearded, wearing crown with feathers and uracus; Bubastis; (2423). And a smaller Figure of the same god; $5\frac{1}{2}$ in. high; the crown flanked by feathers and uraci supported by rams' horns; on the shoulders two creet uraci; Bubastis; (2414); the first poorly preserved; both vare
- 265 A bronze Figure of the mummiform AUSAR (Osiris); 6½ in. high; bearded, wearing the plumed het crown with uraeus on front, and holding the crook-headed staff and flail; Bubastis; (2416); mounted on alabaster, a fine specimen and perfect
- Two small bronze Figures of the goddess AUSET (Isis), seated, nursing the child Heru (Horus): 4½ in. high; the figure draped, a uracus upon the forchead and the usual horned disk upon the head; the right hand upon the breast, the left supporting on her knees the figure of Horus, a uracus upon his head and the distinguishing pendant lock of hair at the side; Bubastis; (2332-36); both good specimens and mounted on alabaster

- A fine Figure of the goddess AUSET nursing the infant HERU; bronze; 8½ in. high; the goddess seated, draped and wearing a very heavy wig on which is placed the royal vulture and a band of uraei supporting the disk and horns symbol; Horus is seated upon her knees; on his head is an uraeus and the usual side-lock of hair; the pedestal has remains of an inscription; the eyes of the goddess inlaid with gold; (2333): a very fine specimen
- 268 A Figure of the goddess Bast; bronze; $6\frac{1}{2}$ in. high; a cat-headed figure, standing; the right hand has formerly held a sistrum, the left, held in front of the breast, holds an aegis; she wears a long close-fitting dress of striped material (shown by engraved lines); one of the ears and both feet restored; Bubastis; (2195); rare 1
- 269 A small bronze Figure of Bast; $4\frac{1}{2}$ in. high; cat-headed, wearing a long tight fitting and sleeveless dress; in her right hand a sistrum, on the left arm a basket and in the left hand an aegis; the figure placed on the original oblong stand of bronze, on the front of which is the remaining part of another figure or symbol; Bubastis; (2194); very vare
- 270 A small bronze Figure of the goddess Bast; 4 in. high; cat-headed and draped in a long close-fitting tunic which reaches to the ankles; in her right hand a sistrum, a basket hangs from her left arm and an aegis is held in the hand. Another, similar, 3 in. high; and two very small Figures of the same goddess, one seated; mostly from Bubastis; (2492, 2517, 2196-7); all mounted 4

 high; a standing figure, ram-headed, the right arm hanging by the side; the left fore-arm and the lower half of each leg wanting; around the loins, the klaft; on the head a royal wig, finely lined with gold inlays, and the lotus sceptre head-dress with a disk and gilt uraeus in front and a feather and uraeus on each side; the eyes inlaid with gold; Abydos; late style and period; (4055); finely modelled and of exquisite finish and preservation [PI. XII] 1
- A Figure of the Nile-god HAPI; pierced from a thin plate of bronze;

- 282 A small bronze Figure of the god HAPI (Apis); $4\frac{1}{2}$ in. high; a bull-headed human figure, wearing royal head covering with disk supported by horns; a short tunic around the loins; the feet and base restored; (2279); an exceedingly rare figure 1
- 283 A bronze Figure of the goddess Hathor (or Hethera); $5\frac{1}{2}$ in. high; a standing figure wearing a long close fitting dress; both arms pendent; upon her head the royal wig with uracus in front, and a ring of uraci supporting the usual pylon-shaped head dress, a horned disk and two long curling feathers engraved on the front and sides; (4387); finely modelled and preserved, and very rare [Pl. X. No. 309]

- 284 A large bronze Figure of Heru-Pa-Chrat: 11 in. high; nude, walking; the right hand raised to the mouth; on his head the double crown with uracus in front; on his shoulder the curled end of the side lock of hair; Bubastis; (4038); an unusually large figure 1
- 285 A bronze Figure of Hert (Horus); 8½ in. high; a hawk-headed standing figure, the body unde except for a loin cloth; upon the head the royal head-dress and a double crown; the right arm by the side, the left bent and extended; a long dedicatory inscription around the base; (4051); a fine figure, and very rare [PL VIII] 1
- 286 A bronze Figure of Heru-pa-chrat; 73 in. high; a nude standing figure, the right hand raised to the mouth; a double crown with uracus upon his head, at the side the pendant lock of hair; the figure is placed upon a long oblong base, the sides of which bear a dedication to Horus by Nekht Rement; Fayoum; (4710); an unusually good and interesting specimen
- A bronze Figure of Heru-pa-chrat; $6\frac{1}{2}$ in. high; the figure nude and seated, the index finger of the right hand near the lips; upon the head the royal head-dress, with side lock of hair and uracus, and a broad ornament, supported on ram's horns and composed of three lotus sceptres and disks, set side by side and flanked by feathers and uraci: (2294); a very fine example
- 288 A VERY FINE FIGURE OF HERU-PA-CHRAT, seated on a throne placed upon an oblong plinth; bronze; 6½ in. high; the god is shown nude, and with the head shaved; on the side of the head is the staple to which the pendant "lock of youth" was attached; around his neck is a broad collar (of copper?) inlaid with four rows of ornament in gold; the eyes, nails of the feet, some lotus flowers, and an inscription on the footstool, are likewise filled in with gold or silver. - 290 A bronze Figure of HERU-PA-CHRAT; 6 in. high: standing, the right hand raised to the mouth; upon the shaved head a uracus; at the side, remains of the long side lock; the base inscribed; Fayoum; (4697); fine, on alabaster stand
- 291 A small bronze Figure of HERU-PA-CHRAT; 5 in. high; the figure nude and walking, the right index finger at the lips; the pendant lock of hair pinned on to the head, which bears the triple lotus sceptre ornament, flanked by uraei and feathers, and supported on ram's horns; around the base a dedicatory inscription by Beb-kem-tcheten-Heru; (2296); fine and rare
- 292 A bronze Figure of Heru-pa-chrat; 4½ in. high; nude, seated and holding his finger to his lips; the closely-cut hair indicated by eircles and dots; a uracus upon the head; traces of an inscription around the foot-rest; Fayoum; (4699). And a smaller Figure, 3 in. high, similar, but with the head shaven, and without adjuncts; Bubastis; (2299); both fine, on alabaster plinths (2)

- A REMARKABLE FIGURE of the Pantheistic god HERUMERT; bronze; 7\frac{3}{4} in. high; a nude standing figure, ithyphallic, and with four arms and four wings; the head is similar to that of the god Bes; on each side of it are the heads of four sacred animals—a bull, lion, jackal and hawk on the right, an ape, cat, hippo and ram on the left; the head-dress, supported on a cornice, consists of two curling ram's horns with two erect tail feathers; a disk and uraeus in front, and two lotus buds and a uraeus on each side; on the base is engraved a dedicatory inscription; (4438); an important and excessively rare figure [PI. IX]
- 298 A VERY RARE POLYTHEISTIC FIGURE; bronze; 6½ in. high; a standing male figure, janiform, shooting an arrow from a bow; the head in front is that of Chnemu, at the back that of Sekhet wearing a wig, and with a uraeus between two horns; the head-dress consists of two tall feathers supported upon a pair of ram's horns, a uraeus and disk at the base, and two uraei at the sides; around the loins is the usual short apron, or shenti, and to the back of this is attached the tail of a bird; (4800); a remarkable figure, and of the highest rarity [Pl. XI]
- 299 A REMARKABLE PANTHEISTIC FIGURE; bronze; 9 in. high; the winged body resembling that of the pigmy-like Ptah-Seker-Uasar, the head that of Amen-Ra; the feet rest upon crocodiles, the right hand holds a serpent; on the body and head-dress are emblems of Osiris, Chonsu, Bes, Anubis, Hapi, Sekhet, Horus, Khepera, Bast, Khem, Nut, &c.; on the top of the plinth on which the figure stands are two serpents and a head of a jackal, in relief; (3771); of great interest, and very rare; on alabaster stand [Pl. IX]
- 300 A VERY RARE FIGURE OF HERU-SHEFIU, the ram-headed divinity of Herakleopolis; bronze, inlaid with gold; 7½ in. high; a standing male figure, ram-headed, the right arm bent and slightly advanced; around the loins a klaft, inlaid with gold lines; on the head the royal wig, and the atef crown with ram's horns at the sides, uraeus in front, and disk at top; (4888); a very rare figure [Pl. XI] 1
- 301 A Figure of Iemhetep, bronze; 4\frac{3}{4} in. high; seated on an openwork throne, a papyrus scroll on his knees; (4713)
- 302 A small bronze Figure of IEMHETEP; 4 in. high; seated, holding a papyrus scroll on his knees; the head shaved, a collar around the neck and a short tunic around the waist; on the base a dedicatory inscription; Thebes; (2321), a fine example, on wooden stand

- 303 A bronze Figure of the god Maahes, $5\frac{3}{4}$ in. high, shown as a lionheaded man, walking; a cloth around the loins, the right arm by the side, the left hand held upon the chest; a pin at the top of the head has probably supported a symbolic ornament; (2358); a very rare figure, on alabaster stand
- 304 Two small bronze Figures of Maahes, $3\frac{1}{4}$ in. and $2\frac{3}{4}$ in. high, lionheaded and wearing the plumed het crown of Osiris; a striped cloth around the loins; the larger has both arms pendent; the smaller holds the crooked staff of domination in the right hand; Bubastis; (2359-60), both rare figures, on stone stands
- 305 A larger bronze Figure of the goddess Mut, $7\frac{1}{2}$ in. high; a uraeus over the forehead and the pschent crown upon her head; both arms hanging by her sides, the feet wanting; the eyes carefully inlaid with electrum; (4880), a fine specimen, on wooden stand 1
- 306 A bronze Figure of the goddess Mut, 7¼ in. high, draped, wearing the royal head-dress with uraeus in front, and the pschent crown with curling feather in front; both arms pendent; (4210), a very fine specimen, on wooden stand [Pl. XI]
- 307 A bronze Figure of the goddess MUT, 6\(^2\) in. high; the goddess seated, her hands lying along her lap; on her head the usual wig and the pschent crown; she wears a long close-fitting tunic with bands at the wrists; (2368), a fine example and a rare figure [PI. X] 1
- 308 A bronze Figure of the goddess Mut, 6 in. high, wearing a long close-fitting dress; the vulture head-dress and the pschent crown upon her head; a hole in the front of the crown has held a curled feather; the right arm pendent, the left bent in advance; from the Hoffmann collection; (2369 c.), on velvet stand, a fine specimen and very rare
- 309 A small and very fine Figure of the goddess Nekheet (or Anren, a form of Hathor); bronze inlaid with gold, $6\frac{1}{2}$ in. high; a draped standing figure wearing the royal head-dress with vulture and surmounted by the atef crown; the left arm slightly advanced, the right hanging by her side; the eyes and an ornamental collar inlaid with gold; Abydos; (4054), an extremely fine and exceedingly rare figure [Pl. X. No. 283]
- 310 A large bronze figure of the goddess NET (Neith), 10 in. high, wearing close-fitting dress, reaching to the ankles, and the tesher crown; (2401), a well modelled but very roughly cast figure; on alabaster plinth

- 311 A fine Figure of the goddess Net; bronze, 7 in. high; standing, draped in a long close-fitting tunic and wearing armlets, bracelets, necklet and the crown of Lower Egypt; the left arm advanced, the right hanging by her side; Thebes; (2400), a very fine figure and rare [PL XI]
- A small bronze Statuette of the goddess NET (or Neith), $5\frac{1}{2}$ in, high, standing, draped in a close-fitting dress, the right arm pendent, the left bent and advanced; on her head the tesher crown of Lower Egypt with two uraei, placed side by side, on the front; Saïs; (2399), finely modelled and a rare variety, on alabaster plinth [PI. XII]
- 313 A small bronze Figure of the goddess Net (Neith) with Heru-pa-Chrat; the goddess, seated on a throne which forms part of a long oblong base, is draped and wears the usual tesher crown; before her stands a small figure of Herupachrat, in the usual attitude; a hole for fixing a third statue (now missing) is seen in front; on the base is engraved a dedicatory inscription; Sais; (2102), imperfect, very rare and of good style
- A fine Figure of Ptah, bronze with gold inlays, 64 in. high: a mummiform standing figure, the head shaved, the hands holding the usr sceptre: the eyes, beard cords, an ornamental collar with large counterpoise, the bracelets and the sceptre, are all inlaid with gold: the face somewhat worn, and the beard wanting; (4386), very rare [Pl. X]

And a small bronze Kettle of Coptic date; (4009); an interesting lat
- 419 A small bronze Figure of Horus; probably a sceptre head; the nude figure crouched and sitting upon the top of an open lotus flower; on his head the horned disk symbol and side lock of hair; in his right hand a flail; height 2³/₄ in.; (4782); very finely modelled, and in excellent preservation
- 420 A Staff-head with figure of the goddess SERQ; bronze; 3½ in. high; the goddess shown as a scorpion with human head, bust and arms; upon her head the royal wig and the disk and horns emblem; (4752); an extremely rare representation
- 421 AN INCENSE HOLDER, and a small CUP for burning the incense; both of bronze; the holder formed by a long cylindrical staff with an open left hand resting upon a lotus capital at the top; the butt end turned round and modelled in the form of the sacred hawk's head; on the upper side of the staff is the receptacle, or box, for holding the incense, shaped as a cartouche, and guarded by the figure of a king, or functionary, kneeling at its base. (The incense was taken from the cartouche and dropped upon live embers placed in the small burning-cup; this was fixed, or suspended, to the hand at the top of the holder). - 428 Four Toilet Spoons, for Stibium or unguents; bronze; 6¼ in. to 7½ in. long; with slender stems and long bowls pointed and deeply grooved; (1528, 9, 4358, 4695). And a Stibium Rod (?) of bronze, an open hand at the end; (3877); all rare
- A long-handled Simpulum, or Ladle; of bronze, 20½ in. long; on the back of the bowl is engraved the symbolic eye; the hooked end of the long square shaft finished as a duck's head; Thebes; (3074); a fine example
- 430 A Simpulum, or Ladle; bronze, 15 in. long; the end of the shaft terminated by a hook shaped as a duck's head; Bubastis; (3998); a fine specimen

- A STANDING FIGURE OF ISIS (?), unusually well carved in ebony; the goddess wears a long tunic, ornamented with diamond pattern, a deep fringe around the lower edge; around the neck is a beadwork collar; the head is bound with a simple diadem knotted at the back, the ends hanging down over the long hair; the left arm is held out straight from the body, the right is extended at a sharp angle; a pair of wings are attached to the undersides of each arm and pass around the back of the figure; total height 8½ in.; a remarkable and very fine carving; Ptolemaic (?); (4152)

And five small caryatid Supports of painted wood, from a casket; El-Wah

- 821 A small Toilet Dish, or tray; wood; 4 in. long; shaped as the Chromis fish; (1462). Another, in hard wood, the open-work handles missing; Thebes; (1527). An Arm and Hand (of uncertain use); wood; Thebes; (102). A Pair of Arms and Hands (sometimes called "Castanets"); wood; VI dynasty; Beni-Hasan; (4854). And an Index Finger and Model of a Vase, in wood; (3193)
- 822 A small Toilet Box, of ebony and sycamore (?); and of irregular oblong shape, the sides and cover inlaid with strips of ivory and triangular pieces of ivory (or bone) and bright blue faience; an ivory knob, stained red, on the cover; size 4½ in. by 3¾ in. by 2¾ in. deep; Thebes: (1507A)
- 823 A long oblong Kohl Case, of carved wood; the sides reeded; on the narrow sides, cartouches of Ser-ka-Ra (Amenophis I) and Men-kheper-Ra (Thothmes III); the pounding stick inserted at top, the revolving cover wanting; height 3\(\frac{3}{8}\) in.; (4529).
 - Another, shorter and with two holes for cosmetics; the revolving cover kept in position by the ebony pounding stick, which still remains; height $2\frac{1}{2}$ in.: Sakkara; (1453)

- 827 Two small Combs; wood; 3¼ in. and 2¼ in. long; Thebes; (1438-9); both very perfect

- 828 A large Comb; wood; 7¼ in. long; the central part of one side marked with incised concentric circles; Thebes; (1440)

 - A wooden Stamp, probably for marking bricks, with figure of scated god and throne (Ausar); from Sakkara; (1847); a very interesting Lot. 4
- 850 A wooden Hoe (or hand-plough); the broad blade fitted into a shaped shaft; the two pieces held taut by means of a twisted cord; Thebes; (2884). A Sickle, of iron, with serrated edge; Coptic, of late period; Kourneh; (2936). And a large fragment of a Sarcophagus of painted wood, with figures of gods and hieroglyphs; (11)
- Two Keys and two Bolts from locks; all of wood; Roman period; two Spindles with whorls attached (one made to serew on); a Distaff with a winding of coarse cord still attached; a small wooden Hammer; a rough model of a Chisel, of bronze, set in a wooden handle; and a stone Plummet; an interesting lot
- 852 A small model in wood of a Libation Vasc, with cover and spout; on one side a column of well-drawn hieroglyphs; from Sakkara; (1534).
 - A Throne and Pedestal for a Statuette, in wood; the arm-rests have been formed by two lions; Kom-el-Ahmar; XXX Dynasty; (3236).
 - A small shallow Cup or Bowl, of hard wood; from the sides project four rams' heads carved in full relief; XII Dynasty; from Kahun; (1519).
 - A child's Whip-Top, of wood; Kahun: XII Dynasty; (3001).
 - A small Ushabti Figure in its original coffin-shaped case; Thebes; (2061); an interesting lot
- A small Stele of brightly painted wood; 10 in. high, the top rounded; on the right stands the figure of a woman, the deceased Pa-nit-quanen, wearing a long wig and a diaphanous robe with coloured collar and borders; both hands are raised in adoration of the hawk-headed god Harmachis, shown seated on the right; between the figures, a table of offerings; above, a large winged disk and five columns of inscription; at the sides, Usr sceptres; from Thebes; XXVI Dynasty; (2015); unusually well painted; the many colours excellently preserved [PLXX]

- 854 A small Sepulchral Stele, of wood, with designs and inscription in coloured tempera; 12 in. high; in the centre, the gods Ra, Osiris, Isis and Nephthys; before them, a table of offerings and a figure of the deceased lady Nes-Khonsu, her hands raised in adoration of the gods; XXVI Dynasty; (2020); the colours in unusually fine preservation
- 855 A broad Sepulchral Stele with rounded top; the designs and inscription in coloured tempera; 10 in. by 11½ in. high; a figure of the deceased, bearded, wigged and wearing a linen tunic, standing in adoration before a seated figure of the god Harmachis; between the figures a table of offerings; XXVI Dynasty; Thebes; (2017); the colours in excellent preservation

- A Sepulchral Stele, in painted wood, of a lady named At-Amen, daughter of the priest Mentu-neb-uast; 14\frac{3}{4}\text{ in. high by 9\frac{1}{2}\text{ in. wide}}; the design represents the deceased adoring Harmachis (the Morning Sun) and Atmu (the Night Sun); the double inscriptions below give prayers to the gods shown; (2024); a good specimen from the Sabatier collection
- 859 A Sepulchral Stele, in painted wood, of the lady Set-iri-ban (?), daughter of the priest Pet-Amen-neb-Nest-taui; the central vignette has figures of the deceased adoring Ra and Tmu; (2025); an interesting specimen from the Sabatier collection
- 860 Two Sepulchral Stele, in painted wood, with inscriptions and designs; one has a vignette showing the deceased adoring Ra, Isis, and the Amenti genii; the second, a man adoring three gods; the smaller piece from Thebes; both of the XXVI Dynasty; (2022-23); well preserved

- 861 A small Sepulchral Tablet of unusual character; 9³/₄ in. by 6 in.; the pointed top pierced to carry a loop for suspending the tablet from a wall; the field is wholly occupied by a long and carefully-written inscription in seven columns; from Thebes; XVIII Dynasty (?); (2016).
 - A wooden Cover from a Ushabtiu box, with ornamental pattern and a line of Demotic characters.
 - And three fragments from a coffin in hard wood, and with relief designs in gesso, coloured and highly varnished; Gourneh; (9-10) 5
- 862 A finely-preserved Sepulchral Box (for Ushabtiu?), with coloured designs in tempera; the whole shaped as a temple, the pylon, with closed double doors, shown on front; on the sides, winged figures of Isis and Nephthys protecting the mummy of the defunct; on the back, a figure of Osiris combined with the Tat symbol and flanked by two uraci with heads of Nephthys and Isis; on the cover, a figure of a hawk: Thebes; (1659); unusually fine and well preserved; the decorations brilliant and pleasingly drawn 1

- 879 A PIN of ivory (handle of a spoon?); on the top, the head of a gazelle, finely carved and stained red; total length 5\frac{3}{8} in. (the end wanting); XII dynasty; (4280); of excellent style and workmanship [Pl. XXI]
- 880 Ten Pins, Stibium rods, &c., in ivory, bone, wood, rhinoceros horn, &c.; of varied shape and period 10
- 881 A Turn-buckle, from a door or casket, and the flower-shaped head of the pin upon which it revolved; ivory, 3 in. long; Thebes; (2938). Handle (from a toilet spoon?); ivory; shaped as two papyrus

 - flowers, the stems joined together to form a loop; on the top of the flowers the two feet of a human figure; Thebes; (3217); bath rare pieces, the last finely carred

- 886 A long boat-shaped Toilet Box and Cover, of stained ivory; the cover has revolved upon a pin fixed at the narrow end; the terminal ornament missing; length 6½ in.; (1506); Thebes
- 887 Nine fragments of Bone Panels from caskets, &c.; carved with Bacchanalian subjects in relief—Dionysos, Eros, dancing Nymphs, &c.; Roman period; Alexandria; (4203) 9
- An ivory Armlet, 2½ in. diam.; Nagada; (4334). A long Pin, ivory; 7¼ in. long, a goose carved on the end; Old Empire; Nagada; (4285). A short thick Pin, 2½ in. long, with a clenched hand at

- 905 A SMALL FIGURE OF THE GODDESS MAT, cut in felspar; a gold feather inserted at top of head; the goldess is represented mummiform, and in a scated position, the arms bent and laid along the legs; height 1\frac{1}{8} in., with feather 1\frac{7}{8} in.: (2353); a fine and very vare specimen from the Posno collection [Pl. XXIII]
- 906 A SMALL SEATED FIGURE OF THE GOD RA, very finely cut in lapis lazuli, and with the double crown in GOLD; the figure is hawk-headed, and sits upon a throne slightly raised at the back; his hands rest upon his knees; he wears a pleated loin-cloth, and has a long wig; upon the bottom of the oblong base is inscribed "Protection for Sa-Bast"; height 2\frac{1}{8} in.; from Abydos; (4171); a very fine and valuable piece [PL XXIII]

- 908 A FIGURE OF PTAH, a pendant from a necklace; gold, 1\(\frac{5}{6}\) in. high; the god, shown standing to left, is mummiform, and holds the usr sceptre; on a small tablet above the name "Ptah" in hieroglyphs; (2452), very rare
- 909 A small Figure of the goddess Sekhet, of gilt silver, 2¼ in. high; a lion-headed figure draped in a long close-fitting dress, both arms hanging by the sides; on the head a wig upon which remains part of an uracus; (2512), finely modelled and exceedingly rare, the feet wanting
- 910 A Figure of Tehuti; silver, 4³/₄ in, high; an ibis-headed figure, wigged and wearing the shenti; (4825)
- 911 A Figure of BAST; silver, 4½ in. high; a cat-headed draped figure, the left hand, held before the body, holding an ægis; Dehr-el-Bahari; (4828)

- 912 A Figure of a Sphinx; silver; $2\frac{1}{8}$ in. long; a couchant lion-bodied figure with male head, wearing the Royal wig; the base, shaped as a cartouche, bears the name of Se-quenen-Ra, the first king of the XVII dynasty; (4876)
- 913 A small kneeling Figure of a King; silver; 1½ in. high; wearing the shenti and the usual Royal head-dress; the arms extended in front, a small spherical vase in each hand; Dehr-el-Bahari; (4829) 1
- 914 A Figure of AN-HERU; silver; $4\frac{1}{2}$ in. high; a bearded figure, wigged and wearing the shenti over a longer tunic; the head-dress consists of four tall tail feathers; the right arm is raised, the left slightly advanced; (4877)
- 915 A small Figure of the goddess TA-URT; silver; 24 in. high; an erect figure with hippopotamus body and head and human arms; (4889) 1
- 916 A Figure of the goddess BAST; silver; 4^a in. high; a cat-headed figure, draped and holding an aegis; (4894)
- 917 A Figure of Ra; silver; 4½ in. high; a hawk-headed figure, wigged and wearing the shenti; on his head a large disk; both arms hanging by the sides; (4895)
- 918 A Figure of HERU-PA-KHRAT; silver; 3\(\frac{1}{8}\) in. high; a nude child figure, the right hand raised to the lips; on the head the pschent crown and the "lock of youth"; (4899)
- 919 A Figure of Angu (Anubis); silver; 3\equiv in. high; a jackal-headed figure, wearing wig and a loin cloth (or shenti); (4900)
- 920 A Figure of the goddess TA-URT; silver; 3\u00e9 in. high; the head and body those of a hippopotamus, the arms human; on the head a lofty head-dress of two long tail feathers with disk and horns, and uracus in front; (4901)

- 923 A small Lion's Head in silver; 1¼ in. high; from an aegis of Sekhet (or Bast); very finely modelled and finished; Bubastis; (2521); extremely rare; on alabaster plinth

- 924 AN AMULET SHAPED AS THE "BA" BIRD, or Soul of a deceased person, represented as a human-headed hawk with fully extended wings; OF GOLD, with INLAYS OF LAPIS, TURQUOISE AND PASTE; 2\(\frac{5}{2}\) in. long, 1 in. high; the upper side, showing the wings and tail, covered with fine and very regularly made divisions (or cloisons) of thin gold shaped to represent the feathers of the bird; the spaces between these are most carefully filled with thin and slender inlays of hard stones; the under side, of plain gold, shows the body of the bird, with the wigged human head; the legs are drawn up, and rest closely upon the body, the tail is reeded: on the top edge of one of the wings is a loop; a companion one on the opposite wing has disappeared; XVIII dynasty; (1430B); in excellent preservation, of the finest workmanship, and exceedingly rare [PI. XXII]

- Two Masks from sarcophagi; in coarse brick-earth pottery; the surfaces coloured with light or dark red pigments; of remarkable type and possibly portrait-masks; height about 8 in.; Bubastis; (28, 30)
- AN EXCEEDINGLY FINE PORTRAIT FIGURE OF A LADY, painted in colours on a large piece of linen, 3 ft. 10 in. by 2 ft. 10 in., originally forming the outer wrapping of the mummy.

The portrait is that of a Lady, of dark complexion and of considerable beauty; that part of the body which remains is shown enveloped in mummy wrappings of a dull crimson colour. The hands, placed upon the breast, are exposed; the right grasps a crook-headed staff, the left a flail. Around the neck is a deep collar; beneath are figures of hawks, an ibis, a solar disk, two uchats and a representation of the mummy lying upon a lion-shaped bier, with the "Ba" or human-headed bird at each end. In a lower

division is a second representation of the mummy, attended by Anubis, Isis, and Nephthys.

On the background upon which this portrait figure is shown are designs arranged in three horizontal registers, with figures of Osiris seated before an altar or table of offerings, Ra, hawkheaded and holding the "usr" sceptre, and Hathor standing in (or before) a tree and pouring a libation to the "Ba" or soul of the deceased. These figures are all shown on the left of the portrait; of the corresponding figures to right, parts only remain; found at Akmim; Graeco-Egyptian period, 1st century A.D.; (49); exceedingly rare and very valuable

- 1432 A panel of Mosaic Glass; 2\sum_{8}^{3} in. wide, original length about 4\frac{1}{2} in.; the design consists of flowers and branches in colour, on a blue background; probably from Lower Egypt; (4304); rare and valuable; an unusually large and perfect example of ancient glass working
- 1433 A large fragment of a similar panel of Mosaic Glass; another from a narrower panel with a similar design; the parts more accurately adjusted before fusing; (4305, 4548); very vare
- 1434 Three large pieces of similar panels of Mosaic Glass; two with designs similar to those of preceding pieces, and evidently from the same factory; (3991, 4305); all rare
- A rectangular inlay of Mosaic Glass: 2 in. by 1½ in., with a very fine chequer design, in red, white, yellow and black, arranged in squares: (4306). Another, triangular, with graduated bands of very minute ornament; (4307). And a small diamond-shaped Quarry of green Glass, inset with yellow rings; (4455); all very unusual and rare
- 1436 A small Tray, of opaque blue glass; the upright sides with lathe-turned lines; Thebes; (4827). And a small Ampulla, of clear-blown and moulded glass, with negro's head on each side; (4131); both pieces of the Roman period; perfect and rare
- A large number of fragments of Glass—various coloured lump glass, glass rods, beads, parts of vases, &c., found on the site of the glass factory discovered by Professor Petrie at Tell-el-Amarna. And various small glazed faience rings, pendants, &c., from the same site:
- 1438 A number of boss-shaped inlays of coloured and plain Glass; a few stone Burnishers, of varied shape included a lot
- 1439 Sixteen fragments of ancient mosaic and "millefiori" Glass Cups,
 Glass Rods used in the making of mosaic glass, a fragment of a
 large Ball, inlaid glass, &c.
- 1440 Two long-necked Balsamaries, of green or clear glass; Roman date: Fayoum; (4482-4483)

- 1441 A small Bottle, of glass, with square body and short neck; Roman; and twenty-one small Bottles, &c., of varied form; antique (Arab?)

- Three tall Bottles, with very long necks and small bodies; two ovoid Bottles; four Jars; all of heavy green glass; Arab 9

- 1444 Two small Snuff Bottles, of old Chinese porcelain, 2 in. high; (these bottles, often found in Egyptian tombs, were for a long time thought to be of extreme antiquity, and were held to be evidence of commercial trading of the Chinese with ancient Egypt); found at Medinet-el-Fayum; (3245-6)

XXVII]
- 1446 A similar STIBIUM VASE, 4½ in. high; of opaque light-blue paste, with striations and threads in yellow and white; (4372); perfect and equally rare [PI. XXVII]
- A small Perfume Vase, or Balsamarium, shaped as an Amphora, with rounded base; $4\frac{1}{2}$ in. high; of opaque white glass or paste, with two bands of striations in orange, and light and dark blue; two handles of striped glass at the sides, and a thread of glass, with spiral in white, around the mouth; from Drah-abul-Nekkah; (1483); exceedingly rare and perfect [Pl. XXVII]
- 1448 A small ovoid Unguentary, with wide neck and petal-like mouth; 3½ in. high; of dull green glass, almost opaque, with striated markings in yellow and deep blue; of the scallops around the lip only one remains; Thebes; (4112); an exceedingly rare form [PI. XXVII]
- 1449 The Neck of an unusually large Balsamary; 2¼ in. high; of opaque light blue paste, with striate markings in yellow, white and dark blue; (4371). And the base of a Stibium Case, with regular vandyck-like striations in dark and light blue and white; (4383); both very unusual specimens

1450	A small Balsamary (Amphoriskos); 4 in. high; of transparent deep blue glass, with spiral bands and striate vandyck-like markings in blue paste; (4374); a rare colouring

1456	Another; 2¾ in. high; of same form and colouring as preceding, but with decoration arranged in parallel spiral bands; (4375); very rare and perfect
1457	A small Balsamary, shaped as an Oenochöe; with trefoil mouth and high handle; $4\frac{1}{2}$ in. high; of dark blue glass, with spirals and zigzag markings in yellow and blue pastes; the surface oxydized 1
1458	Another; 4 in. high; similar to preceding; (4370)
1459	Another; 3\frac{3}{4} in. high; of similar form; deep blue glass, with striations of yellow and white (most of the colourings perished); (4369)
1460	A small Balsamary, or Perfume Jar, shaped as an alabastron; 6 in. high; of fine deep-blue glass with bands and striations in light-blue and orange paste; two loops at the sides; (4379); a fine example
1461	A similar piece; $3\frac{3}{4}$ in, high; same form and similar decoration; (4381); the lip chipped; very fine
1462	Another, smaller; 34 in. high; perfect 1
1463	Another; $5\frac{1}{2}$ in. high; of similar form, but of deep red glass with striations in opaque light blue paste with traces of white; (4380); a very rare piece; repaired
1464	Another; 4 in. high; of green glass with fine and very regular markings in white and orange paste; very fine and very rare [PI. XXVII]

1465 Another; $4\,in.\,high$; of dark opaque glass with striations in light blue and yellow; Drah-abul-Nekkah; (1511E); rare

- 1466 Another; 5 in. high; of similar form; blue glass, with feather-like markings in yellow paste; rare
- 1467 Another; 3¾ in. high; of white crackled glass with zig-zags, etc., in dull crimson; the loop handles at sides wanting; (1511F); very rare and fine
- 1468 Another; 4³₈ in. high; of transparent bluish-coloured glass and without markings; (4382); one of the handles wanting [Pl. XXVII] 1
- 1469 A small Balsamary, or Perfume Vase, shaped as a "Bombylios"; 2\frac{1}{4} in. high; of dark blue glass with lines and striations in light-blue and orange paste; (4376); rare 1
- 1470 Another, similar in form, size and decoration; (1511g); rare and in perfect preservation [Pl. XXVII]
- 1471 A long slender Balsamary; 4½ in. high; the body square and taper ing to the base, the neck round; of dark purple glass with white or yellow markings; Arab?; from Luxor; (3684); rare
- 1472 Another; of similar form; $5\frac{3}{4}$ in. long; of clear blue glass with white markings; Arab?; (4113); rare
- 1473 Another; of similar form but with a round body; of green glass with white markings; Arab; (4114); very rare 1
- 1474 Another; $3\frac{1}{2}$ in. high; of similar form, but with two loop handles at the sides; green with white markings; Arab; (4716)

MISCELLANEOUS ANTIQUITIES.

- 1475 Two small Finials of bronze: one shaped as the head of a Ram, the other as the forepart of a Lion; both of Roman date, well modelled and finely preserved

- 1502 Mexican and Peruvian Pottery: Two Vases, of light pottery; shaped as seated men, a long slender spout rising from the head 2

- 1505 Two Vases, of black pottery; one with squat circular body, long spout, and broad handle, has a figure of a bear; the second, shaped as a melon, bears a figure of an eagle; both interesting 2
- 1506 Two Vases, of black pottery; one with short cylindrical body and arched top on which rests two fruits, fitted with a long spout and the figure of a bird; the second, spherical, has a figure of a human-headed animal with a short broad spout on top; both unusual 2
- 1507 A squat circular Vase, with heads of Indian corn and short neck on top; another, shaped as a tortoise; another, formed by two spherical bodies joined together, one with a long open neck or spout, the other with a closed neck topped by a bird, the two connected by an open-work handle; all of black pottery


